# History of the Eclipse Project

- Initiation in 2001
  - Initial release of the Eclipse technology platform (Platform, JDT, PDT)
  - Founding consortium board comprised Borland, IBM, MERANT, QNX Software Systems, Rational Software, Red Hat, SuSE, TogetherSoft and Webgain
  - Eclipse Public License (EPL)
  
- Eclipse Foundation 2004
  - Independent not-for-profit organization formed in 2004
  - Definition of bylaws, membership model, initial IP process
  - Foundation management staff hiring starts

- 15+ management team



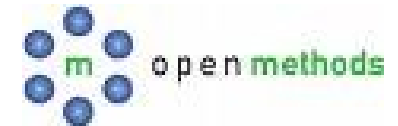

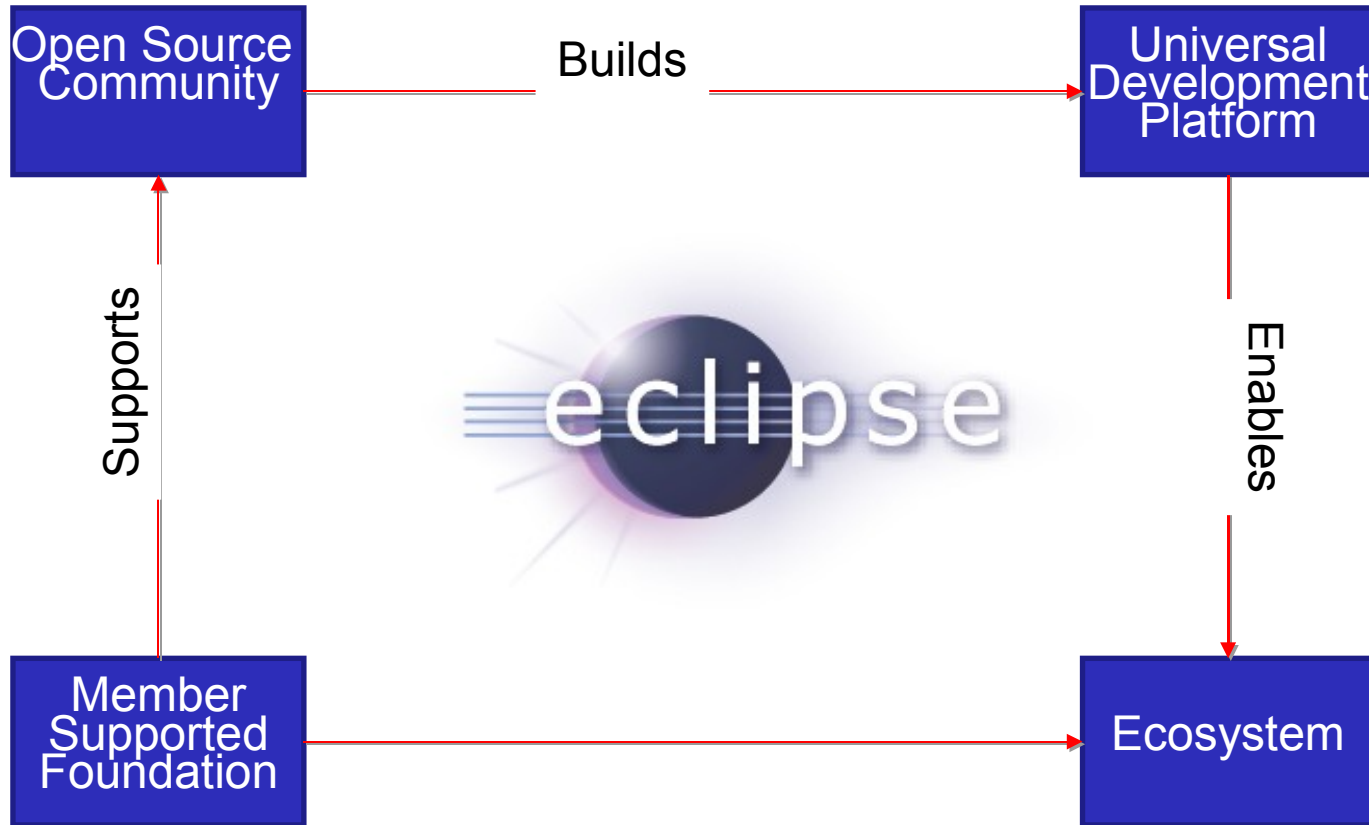

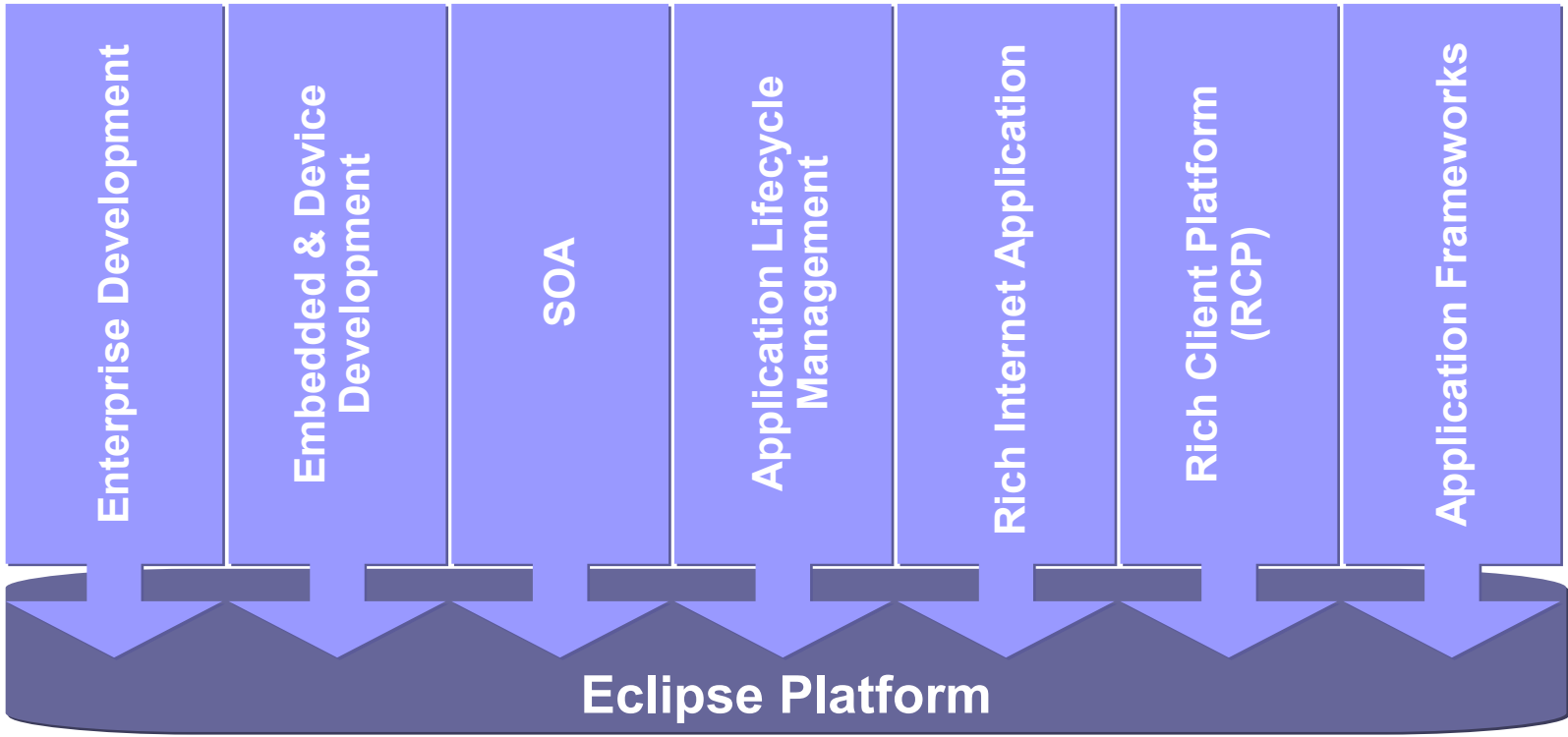

# Boeing and Eclipse

- Initial contacts between Boeing and Eclipse Foundation in March 2007
- Project proposal OSEE in 1H/2007
- Strong interest from various parties (Airbus, GM, Bosch, etc.)
- OSEE has a high potential to serve as a data and tools integration platform in and beyond the aerospace industry ==> systems engineering platform
- Inhibitors for buy-in
  - Code and sample app / demonstrator not yet available
  - Lack of external evangelism, communications
  - Visibility of executive sponsor
  - Functionality/Extensibility not well understood yet





# Advantages for Boeing and the industry

- Sharing of development and maintenance costs
- Standard for integration of 3<sup>rd</sup> party tools
- Creation of eco system larger than aerospace industry
- Free distribution to stakeholders (supply chain and customers, research and education)
  
- IP clearing process
- Industrial strength forge
- Brand recognition

# Open Source Development Platform



- Open Source development model encourages collaboration and open innovation
  - Openness, Transparency, Meritocracy
  - Everybody can participate
- Open Source licensing allows competing vendors to collaborate on the infrastructure technology
  - No requirement for royalties.
  - No single control point of intellectual property
- Open Source business model encourages rapid adoption of technology
  - It is free and easy to access
  - Everybody can consume
